WORCESTER - The hometown of world cycling champion Marshall Walter "Major" Taylor will host a screening of the award-winning documentary "Biking While Black: Continuing to Ride Through Decriminalization, Disenfranchisement & Gentrification" at 7 p.m. Tuesday at North High School, 140 Harrington Way.

Admission is free.

Yolanda Davis-Overstreet will conduct a question-and-answer session after the screening. In addition to being the film's director and co-producer, Davis-Overstreet is the founder of Ride in Living Color, a grassroots bicycling advocacy effort initiative started in Los Angeles in 2011.

Taylor was a world-class bicycle racer who moved to Worcester from Indianapolis in 1895.
